



# Lisa Lee Lawson




The Class of '82 dedicates the 1982 Tiger to the memory of Lisa Lawson.


# One Path Led to Columbus . . .








And a "Music Man" Success



## For the Class of 1982 the Path led to Freedom and New Responsibilities






