















## Varsity Wrestling









The business classes at NBHS teach the students the skills they will need to know when they get into the business world. They also teach the consumers what they need to know about the way the business world works.


Mr. Hemminger teaches the shorthand, Typing I & II, and accounting.

## The Scientific Approach














Mr. Utz teaches Biology I and II and earth science. These classes give a student a good background in the study of the earth, and the life sciences.
