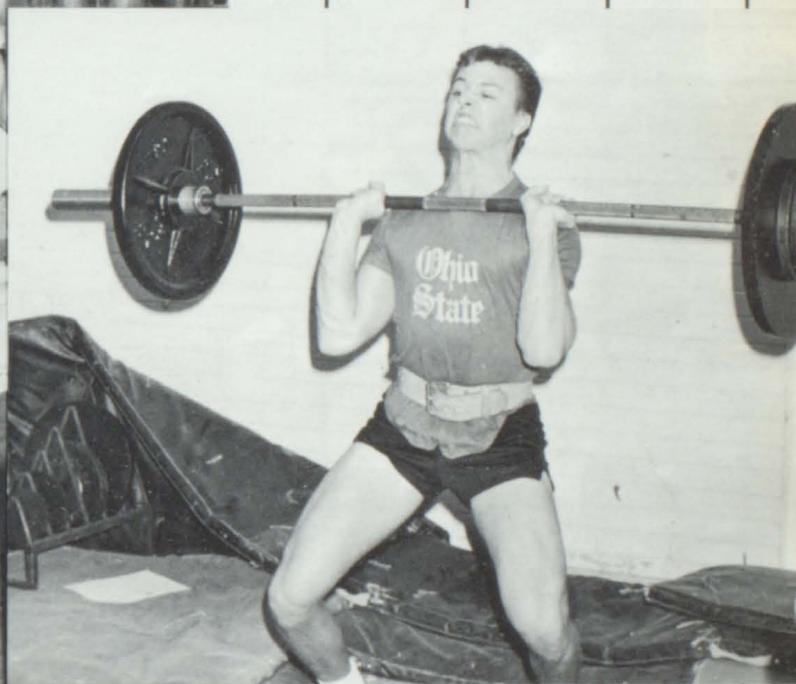

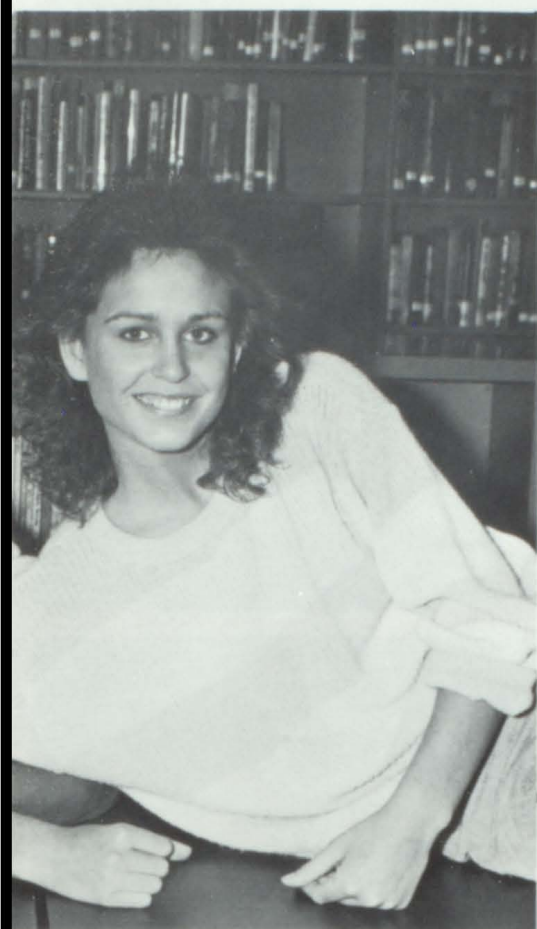

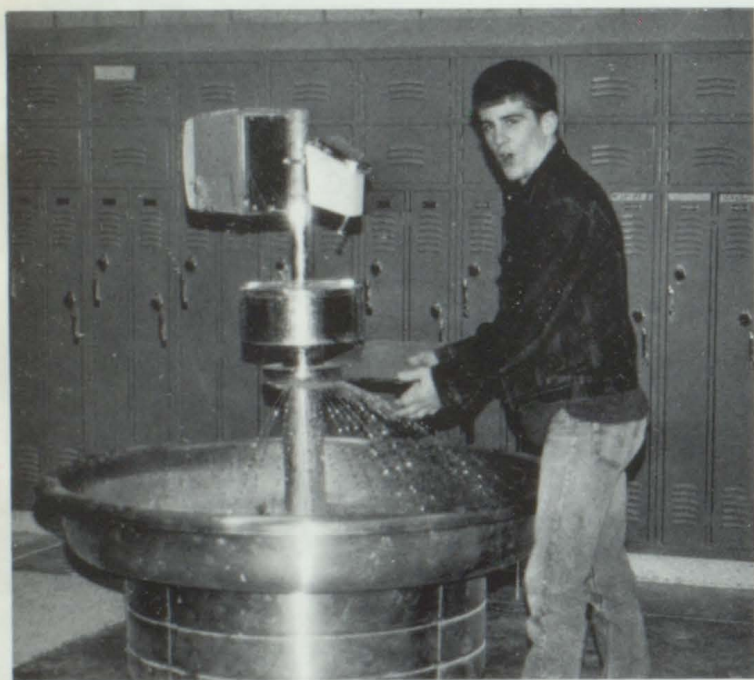
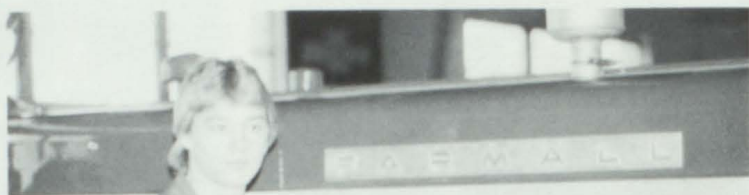

The second annual academic honors program was held Tuesday, May 19, in the high school auditorium.

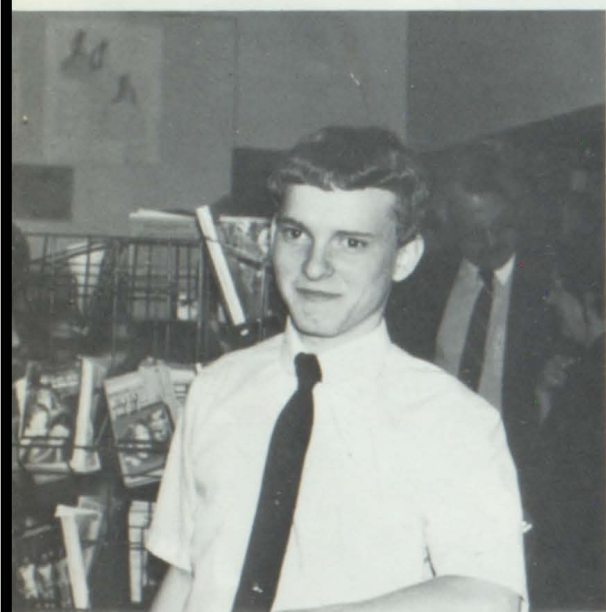
Receiving U.S. Savings Bonds were top seniors Erica Bower and Galen Gerig.

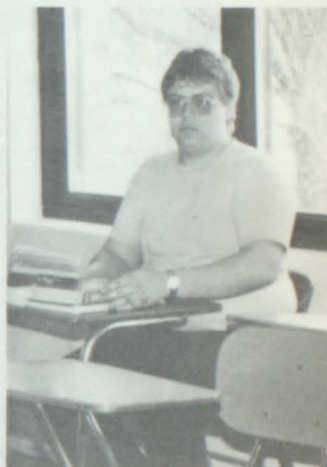
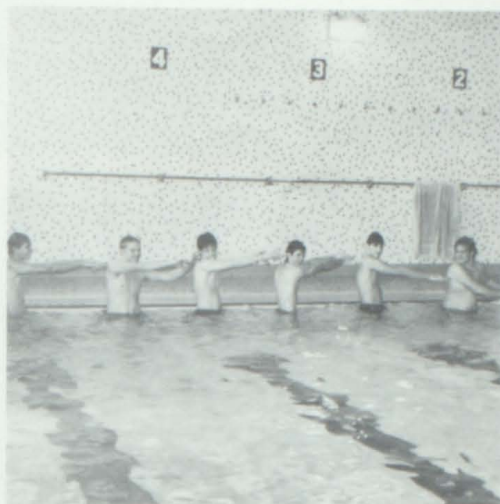
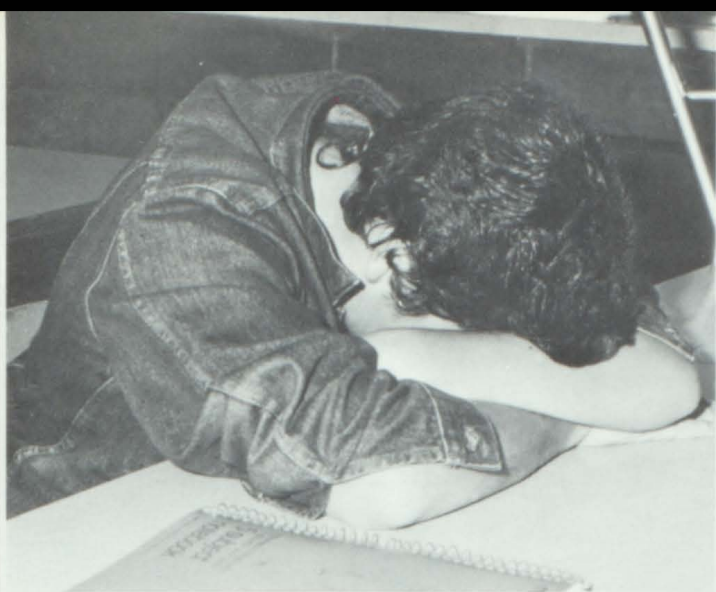

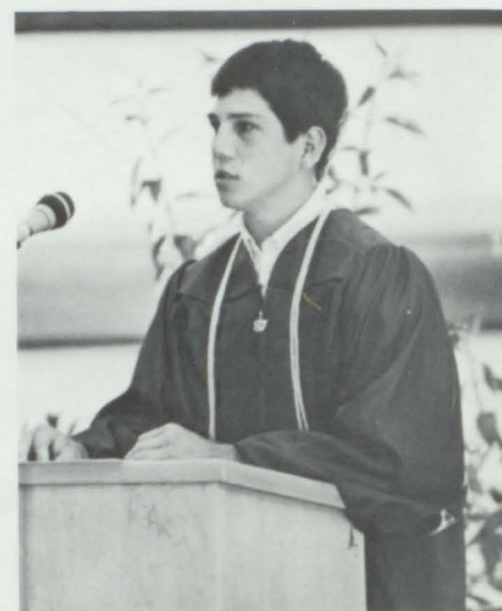
