








# Voters Save Activities With Levy

In the fall of 1987, Superintendent Ken Cline called for a student assembly to announce some grim news: N.B. (like so many Ohio schools) needed another levy to keep operating. This time the consequences of a failed levy would be heavy. Students stood to lose a lot: all sports (including spring sports of 1988), clubs and activities, proms, trips, etc., would be cut.

Although students and faculty rallied to the cause by making posters, writing letters to the newspaper, and marching in a parade to promote the passing of the levy, the

news in November was bad. The operating levy went down.

For several months the fate of all extracurriculars remained in limbo. Interested people in the community looked for other ways to support the sports program. Things were pretty shaky . . . until February, that is, when voters supported the school once again by passing an emergency levy.

Sports and activities for students remain on the agenda for the 1988-89 school year, but cuts in personnel were still made.




## The Model Student
