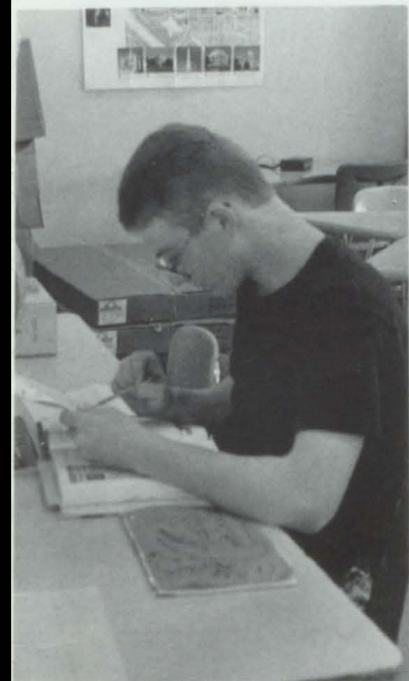

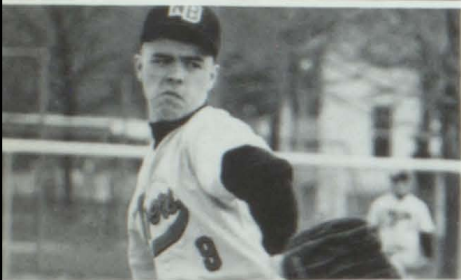

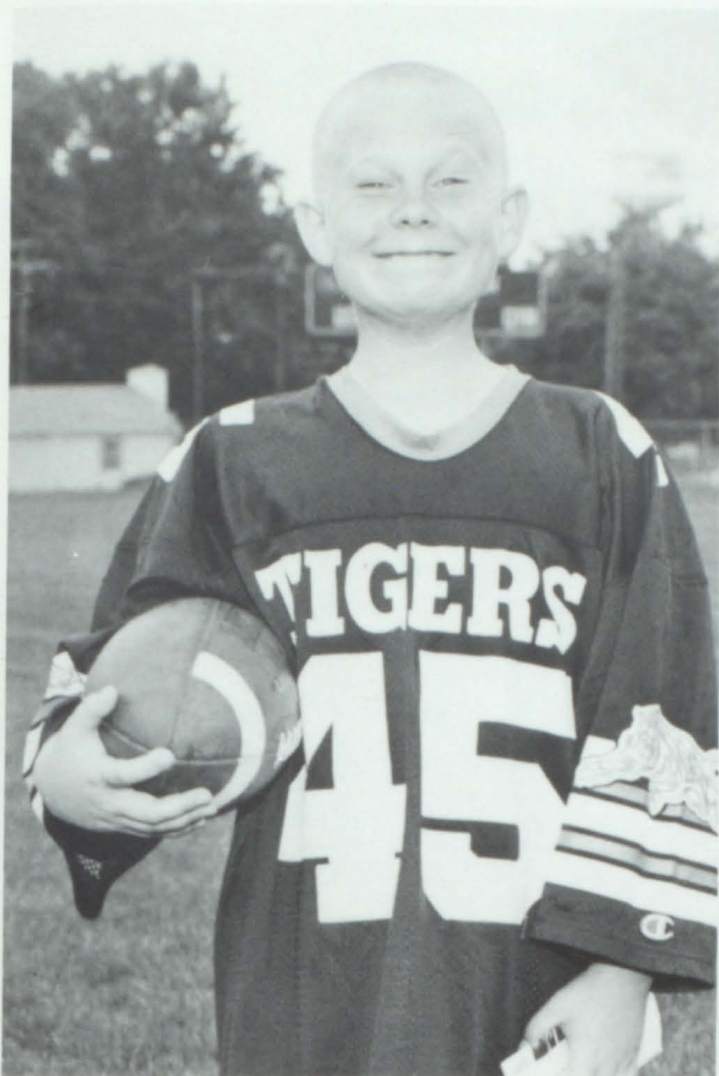

When I first entered the exchange program, you said I was crazy, giving up my senior year with all it holds: seniority, prom, and graduation.

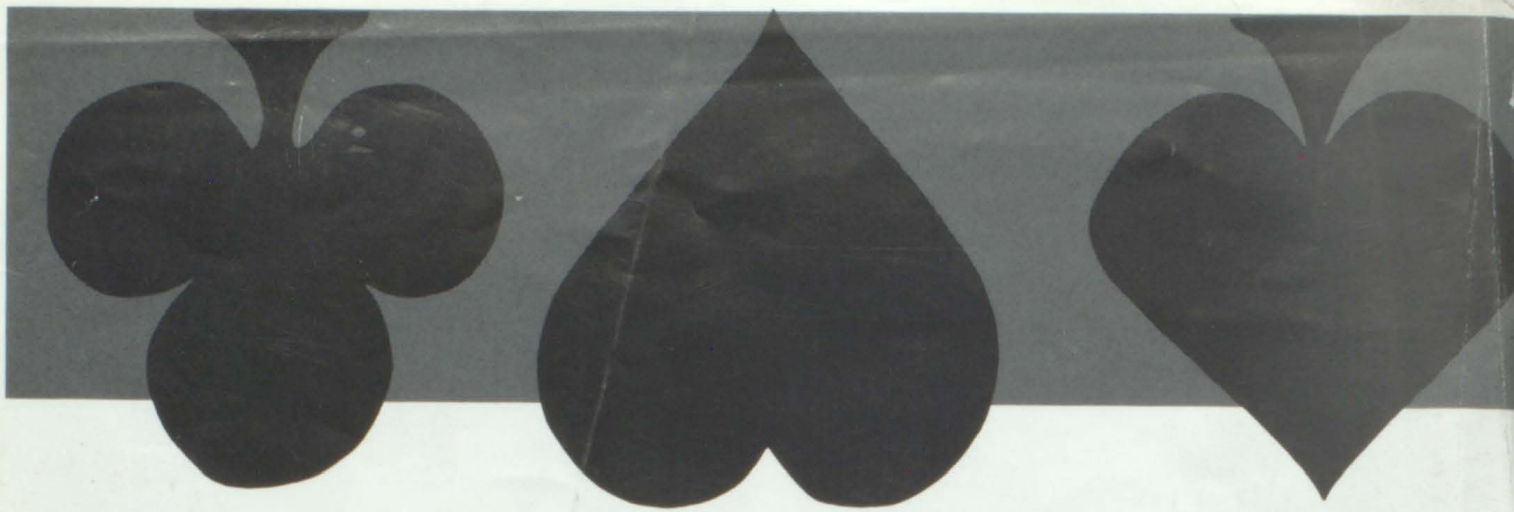
But this year has been the experience I expected and more. Sure, I missed all the events of my senior year, but I gained new friends, a different perspective, a great tan, and a different language.

I have seen our school is not so bad after all, and I assume Mr. Lang's jokes lose nothing when translated. Our school is like a big family, that is what I miss most of all.

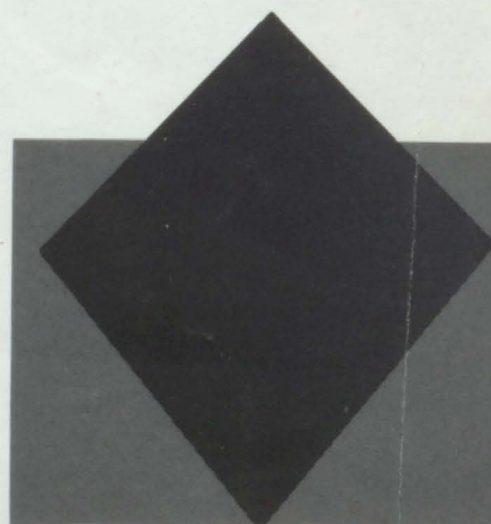
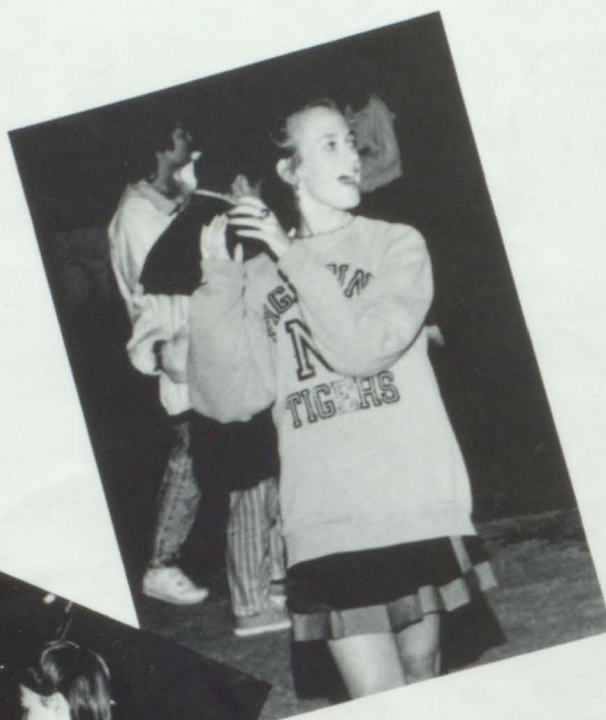
Good luck to everyone and I hope the friendships we have formed throughout this part of our lives will stay with us for many years to come.

Administration Organizes Tutorial Programs

The staff reached out to students last spring. They offered assistance and support in preparing for the proficiency tests and with homework questions.


Some staff members began helping on Tuesdays and Thursdays starting April 20 thru May 27. The sessions ran from 3:10 to 4:10 p.m.; more help was offered upon request. If you were in need of writing assistance, the writing lab was open during the school day. Although Loren Welch didn't attend regular-

ly, he felt, "It improved my writing skills." This help was for students in grades 6-12.


The staff also reached out with summer enrichment programs in August. There were three of them, one for remediation for the middle school students to help them prepare for high school, a second intervention for students needing help to pass part of the proficiency test, and a third enrichment camp for any student seeking more academic challenges.

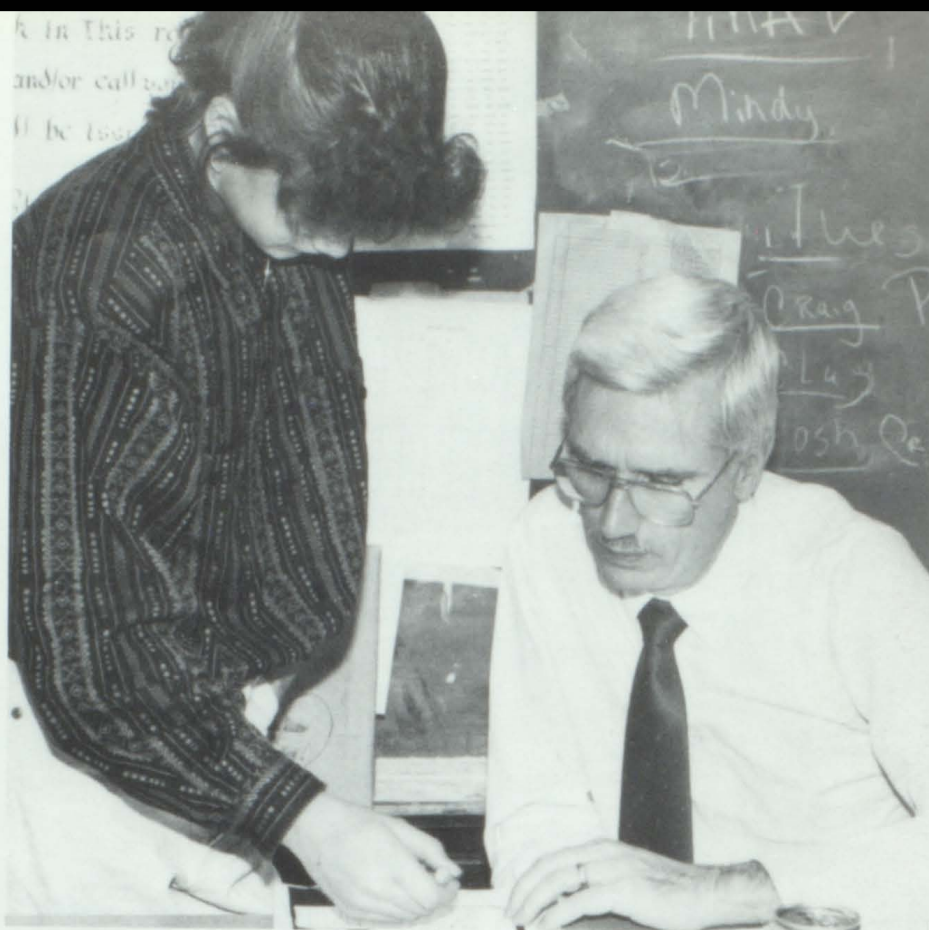

erator). You never know what strange, new life forms may be lurking inside.

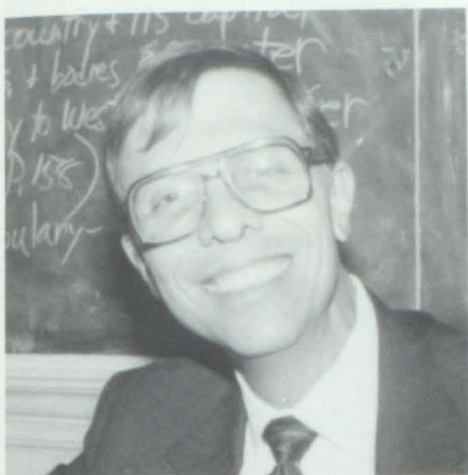
This reporter was attacked by an alien life form while attempting to get the inside scoop and nearly lost her life while trying to escape to get this story.
