


With the Varsity in front and JV in back, the group participates in a cheer. This year it is mandatory for each cheerleader to lead 5 cheers per game.





This year's Student Council started with renewed determination to help ease the tension between students and administration as they began the year with a new process of voting for class officers and council members. In previous years, students who wanted to run for student council or class officer positions had to fill out a form. The form had to be signed by ten other students in their grade, and they also had to have two teachers sign it. The students who completed the paper and turned it in would be on the ballot, and were able to run for both student council and class officer. This year students still had to fill out a paper stating what position they would like to run for; however, they ran as representatives of precincts rather than representatives of their grade. They also had to choose whether they wanted to run for student council or class officer.





CHALLENGE DAY

Challenge Day is a program to help students get to know their classmates better. Another goal is to make the school, as a whole, a better place for students. The freshman and sophomore classes attended this special event together. Group leaders, consisting of teachers and community members came an hour early for a meeting to learn what the day would be based on and what the program had planned for the students to learn.

The main leaders were Cherine and Vinnie. They travel to many different schools trying to change the way young people view each other. They want to spread the message that people are always there for you even if you don't believe they are. They started the morning by having students play a few games helping students get comfortable with each other. Then students had to find someone they didn't talk to much and share with their partner things that nobody knew about them. This helped them to form trust with this person. Next the students all came together and listened to the life stories of Cherine and Vinnie. Neither of them had easy lives. They learned a few techniques to be more understanding of others. They talked about "dropping the water line", and sharing true feelings. For the guys in the room, they talked about "stepping outside the man box"

Next, the students played a number game to get into groups of five or six. They shared many important details about themselves during group time which met sporadically throughout the day and for lunch. The students got to know more about each other and more about the leader of the group. Participants also got to break away from the groups and just talk to people they normally didn't talk to.

The most emotional part of the day came in the afternoon. Everyone got in a line as Cherine read off a statement, and if it applied to your life, you walked across the line and faced all your classmates who did not have to deal with that problem. The statements included deaths of family members, racial backgrounds, and derogatory names one might have been called. Students found out that they were not alone, as many students, and leaders crossed the line, many times.

Later in the afternoon each person took time to write a card to an important person in his/her life. It was supposed to be like their last words to that person. The day ended by taping posters to the students' backs and running around letting others write positive things about each other on the poster.




