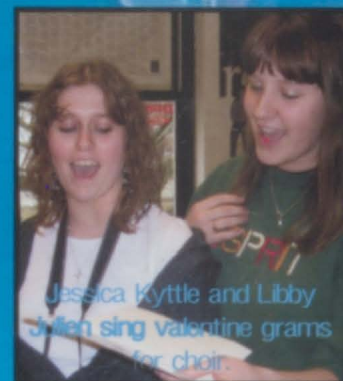

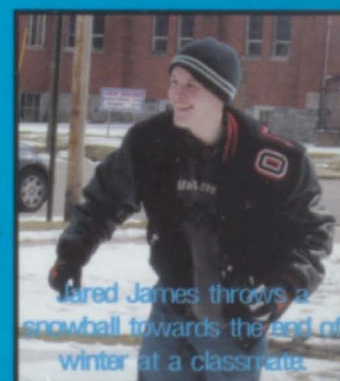

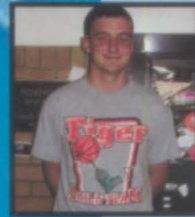

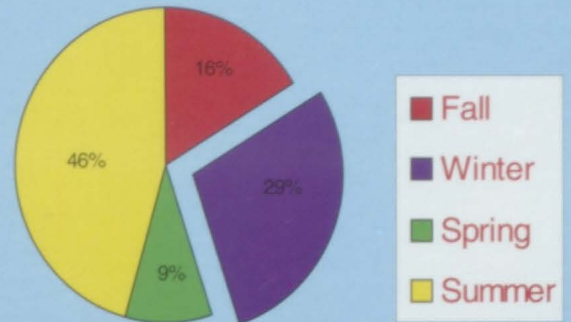

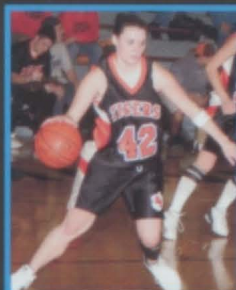

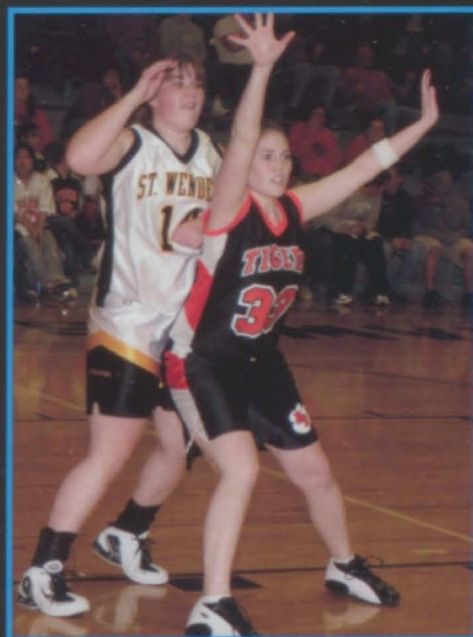

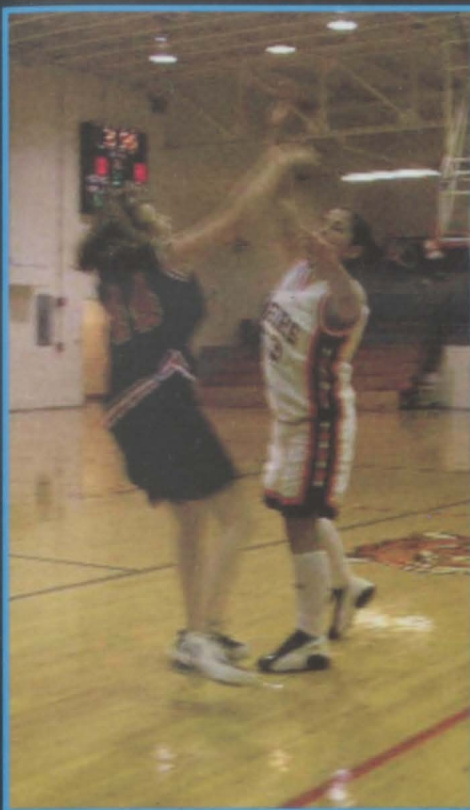

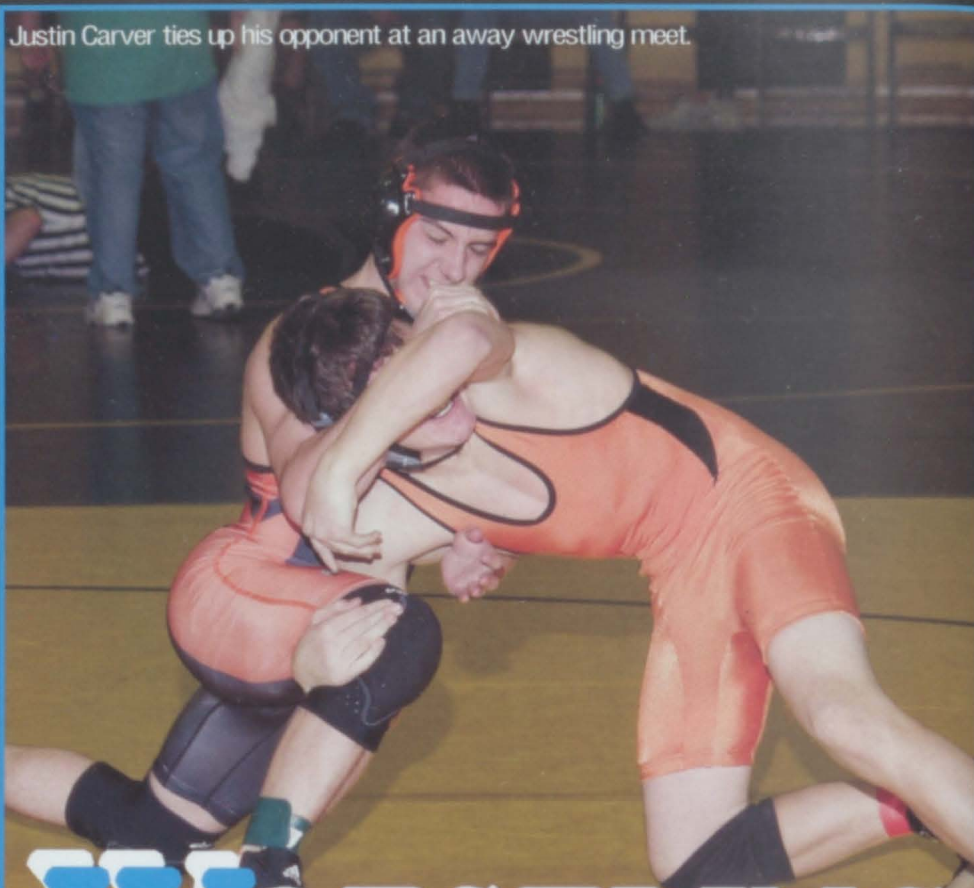

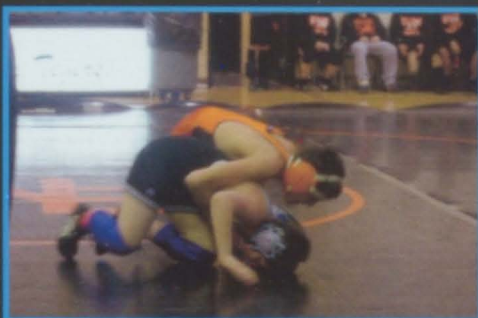

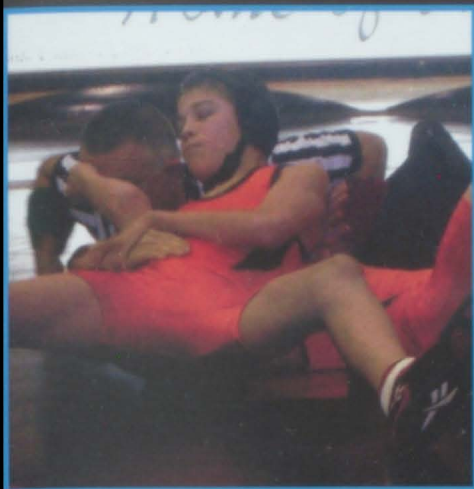

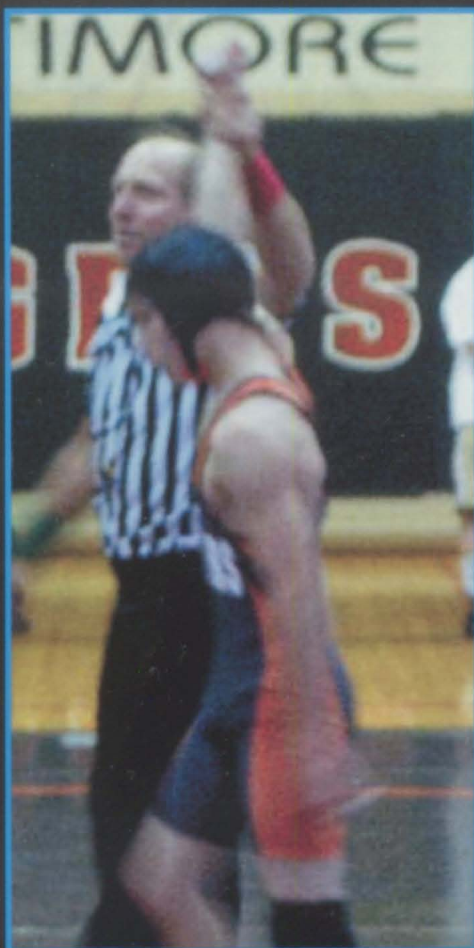

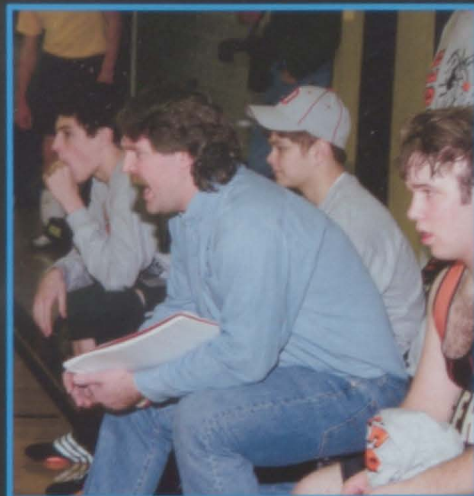

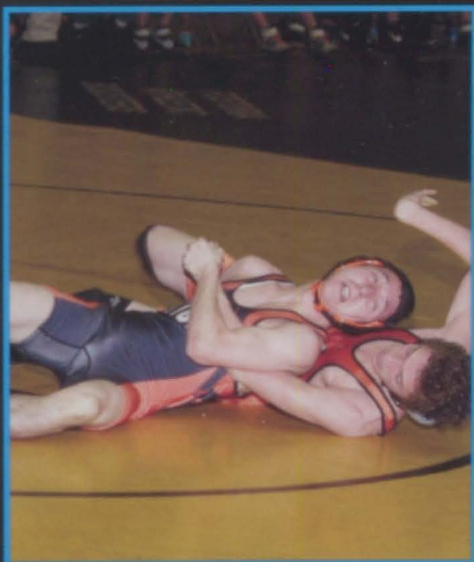

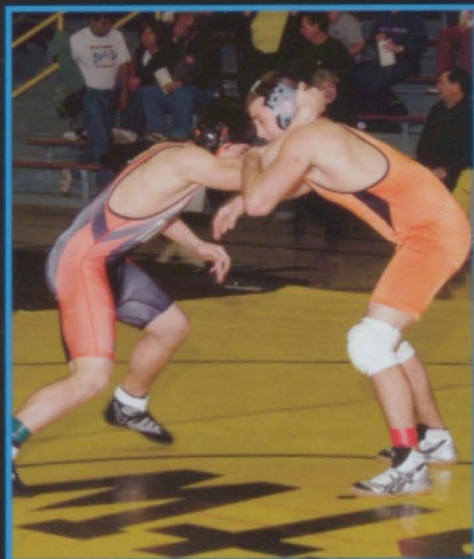

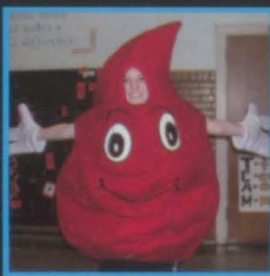

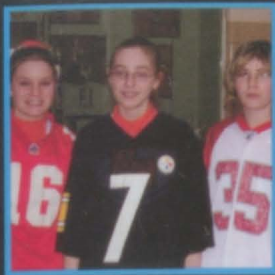

Student Council took orders for roses and carnations the week before Valentine's Day and passed them out during AA on February 14. Did you get your special someone a flower that day?

On March 23 council members worked with the American Red Cross giving students and community member the opportunity to donate blood. This year the Blood Drive went very well, even though many people were turned away due to a high heart rate caused by fear of needles, or finding out that they had low iron. When the donors, age 17 or older, arrived to give blood, they had to start by reading a packet that told about different conditions that would make a person ineligible to give blood. If none of the conditions affected them then they moved on to meeting with a nurse. The nurse asked them additional questions and checked their iron, heart rate, and took their temperature. Then they had to wait until a bed was open. Once a bed was available, they were made comfortable and the nurse prepared the donors arm to give one pint of blood. Most students that gave blood said the worst part of the experience was getting their finger pricked at the beginning of the process. The Blood Drive is a very beneficial event that we have here at North Baltimore. Most students enjoy donating to the Red Cross for many reasons, like knowing they may be helping save someone's life, or just because they get out of class.

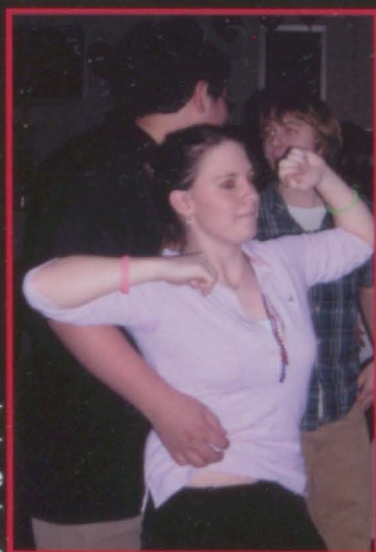

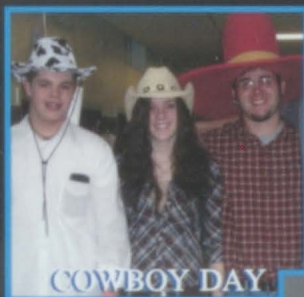

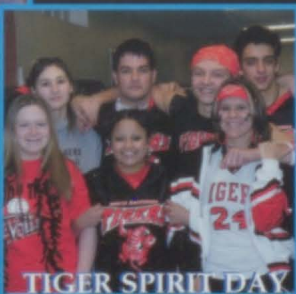

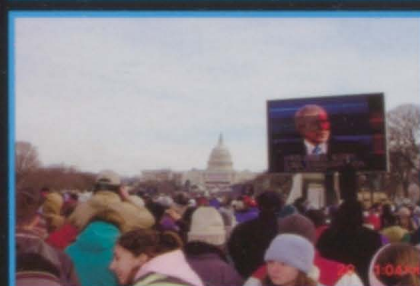
group of students went to a shopping mall to eat and shop for a few hours.

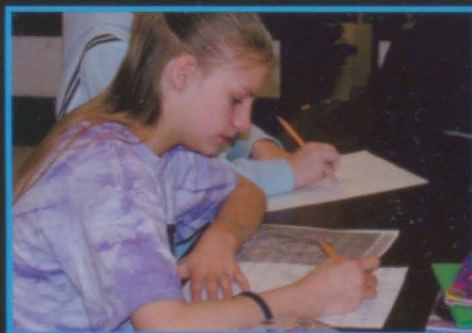
