Hurdling Obstacles

The track season of 2006 was well needed at North Baltimore. The year looked good for runners and throwers. The sprinters were strong in their events, while the distance runners worked hard and improved throughout the year. Throwers were well balanced between shot and discus. Tyler Simon also showed promise in the event of the high jump.

Coach Shelley Hillard was excited about this season with so many returning lettermen. The coaches' felt most of the team would make it to district finals in their events. The team had many underclassmen that were filled with potential and filled most positions needed. Stress from participating in two sports proved to be too much for some and because of this, the team lost a key runner that they had the first half of the season.

In order for the relay teams to make it to districts, the team asked senior, Tyler Boyer to run with them, knowing he was more than able to fill the spot. Coach Shelley planned practices at Van Buren's all

weather track when the team trained for districts. The Tigers went to districts with confidence and excitement. They surpassed their expectations with everyone improving. Valerie Sterns made it to district finals in the 100m hurdles. The boys' relays made two out of the three sprinting relays. The boys took 13c seconds off their 4x400m team relay. The team was excited that 6 people made it to regionals including Tyler Simon who made it after jumping six feet in the M.A.L. and then 5' 10" at Districts where he placed fourth. At regionals the boys 4x100m relay time was 45.8 and was .2 seconds off the school record. The 4x400m relay team ran a 3:37 and placed 6th but unfortunately didn't make it to finals, but Tyler Simon did and went on to compete at state after accomplishing a height of 6' 2" at regionals where he was the champion. At state, he placed ninth in event of the high jump with 5' 10". The 2006 team was the first to go to regionals in 18 years from North Baltimore and proved that there are great things to come in the future.



Throughout past decades, many great achievements have stood out. These accomplishments make students who have, and currently attend NBHS feel we are among the best.


The only women inducted from the school years 1891 to 1976, for continuous athletic success, and lettering in college was Ruth Tarr Fausnaugh. The class of 1997 shows vibrantly through Joe DeVaul. He earned four varsity letters while attending the University of Findlay for track and field. He is also in the top 10 all time throwers for the javelin and shot put. to top it off, Joe is an NCAA academic All-American.

The 1995 football team is another stripe in history. They were the undefeated M.A.L. champions, with the perfect record of 10-0.

Clarence "Red" Jennings, Class of 1925, participated in the 1925 boys class "B" State Championship relay team. A state record of just 3:37.5 minutes. Clarence ran the last leg of the race. Orville "Slip" Bayliss also helped sprint the team to victory. Running the third leg of the race was Meryl Kaufman. He completed his lap in only 51 seconds, the fastest lap of all competitors.

Mike Clark in the class of 1995 was a 4-year letter winner in baseball as well as basketball. He played baseball at John A Logan College in Illinois. Mike is now an assistant baseball coach at NB.




The 2006 Winter Homecoming







during the play season and had to be off my feet for two weeks. My tribe really helped fill me in on staging, though we didn't have much direction."







Vice president Adam Emahiser agrees saying, "Since it


was my first year, I was excited and it was fun. We got a lot accomplished."
