2. "Math is not my favorite subject, but I'm getting better at it," Jennie Povenmire claimed, after she and Brian Leimgruber take notes in Geometry class.




Dancing In Circles







Members of the court had fun before the dance started by goofing off for some personal photo memories. "We were defiantly bringing sexy back!" Brooke Simmons said.

Make Way For Our Stars




