3. The senior football players gave a speech at the Senior Pep Rally "We were coming off a win and looking for another one," Senior Lance Mendieta remembered.

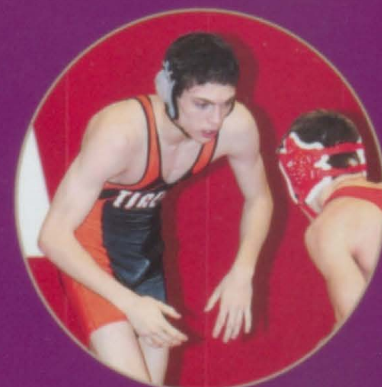

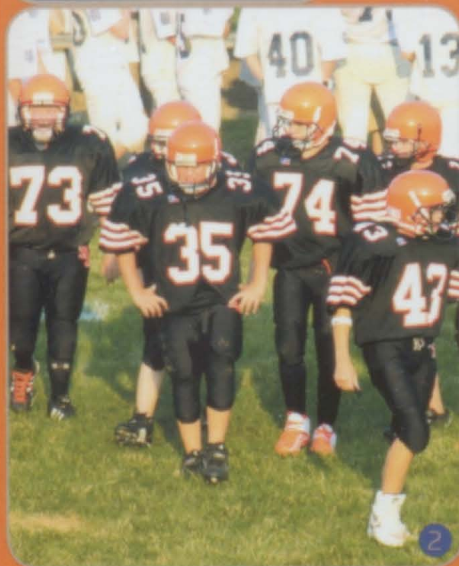

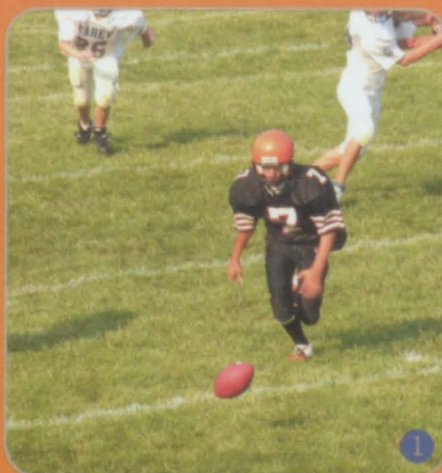

4. "The game is ours if we continue to block," Head Coach Eichar warns his team during their half time talk. The coach always tried to boost the teams morale whenever he made a speech.

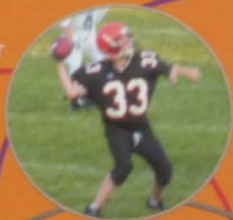

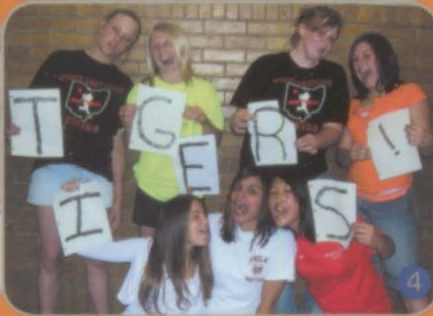


Spiraling Into Action

A Time For Improvement

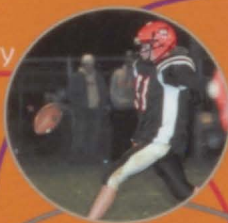

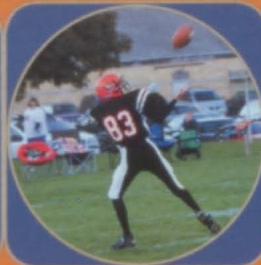

Starting the Season 5-1

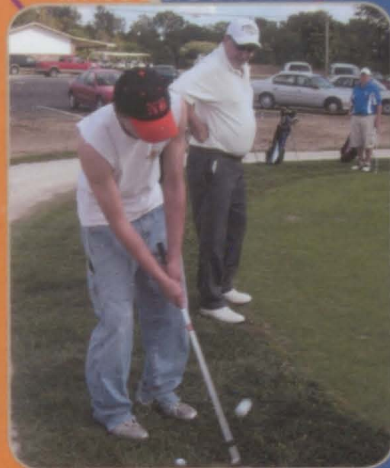
