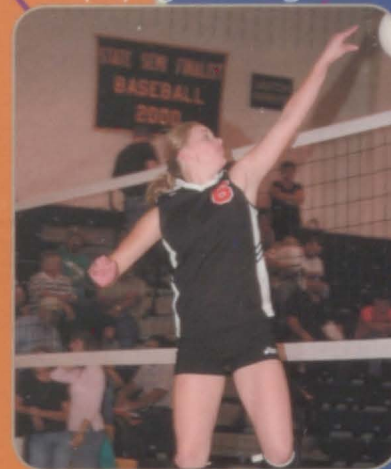

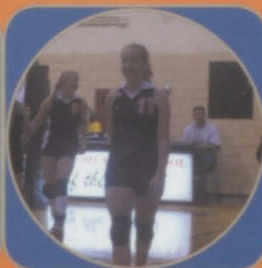

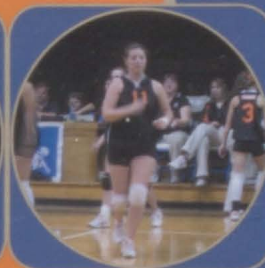

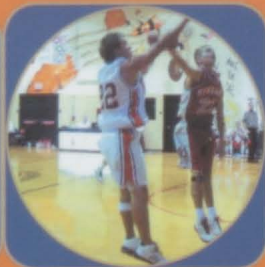

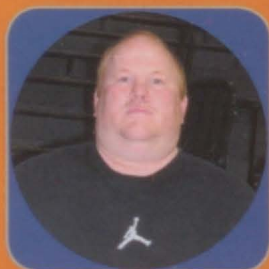

Nothing Brought Them Down.

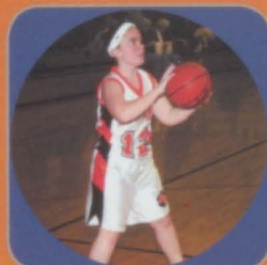

Taking Down One Opponent At A Time

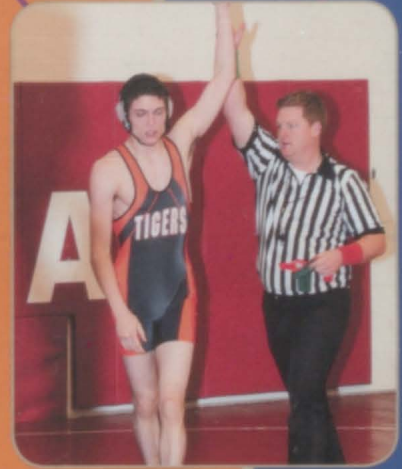

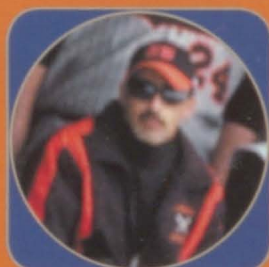

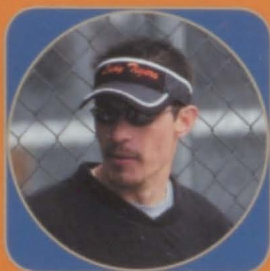
