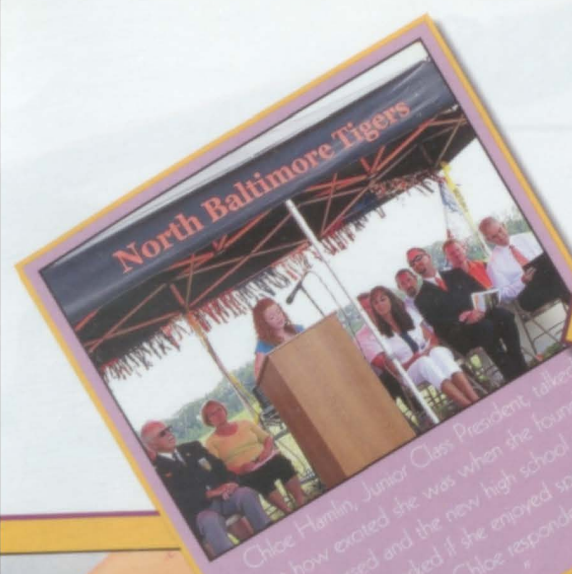

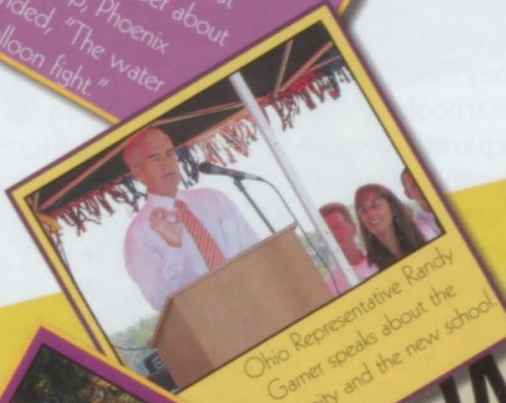

HARD AT WORK

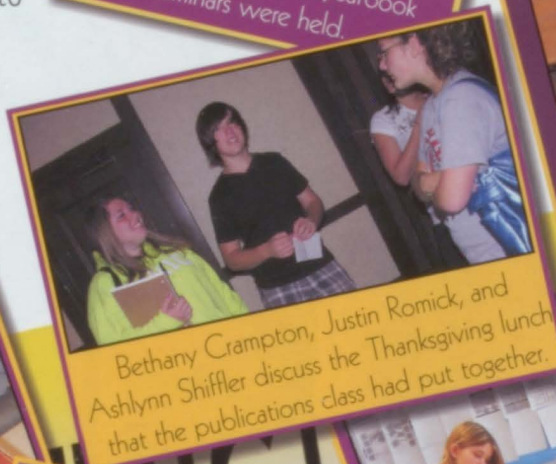

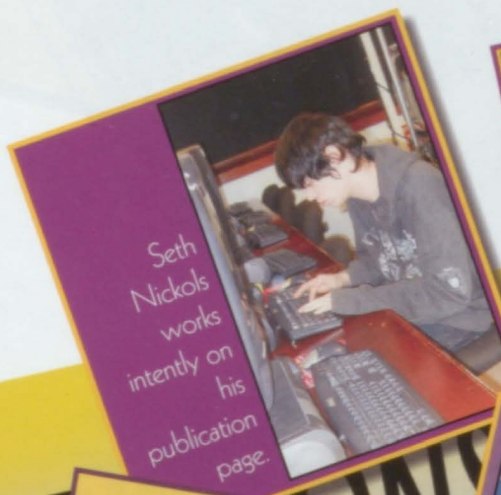

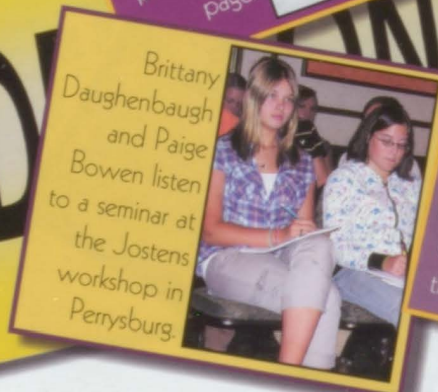

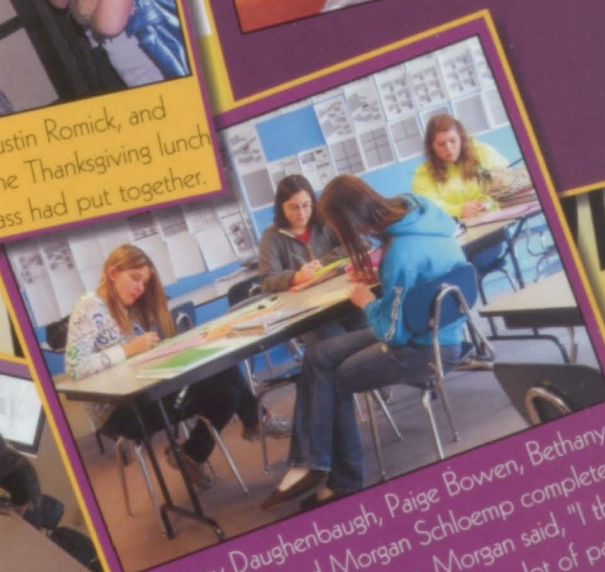

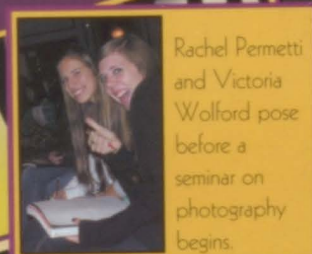

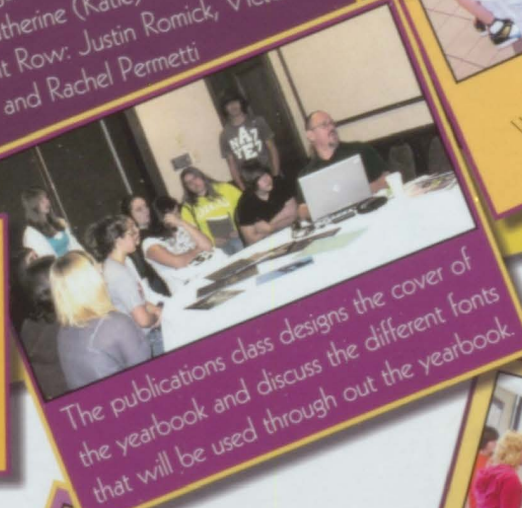

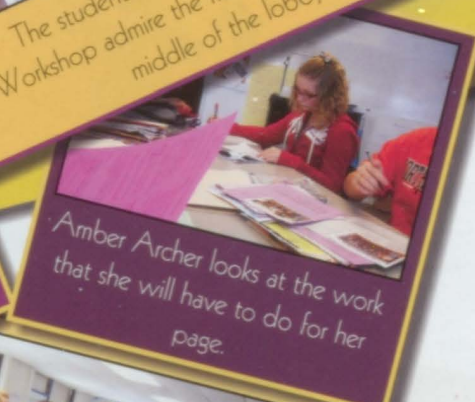

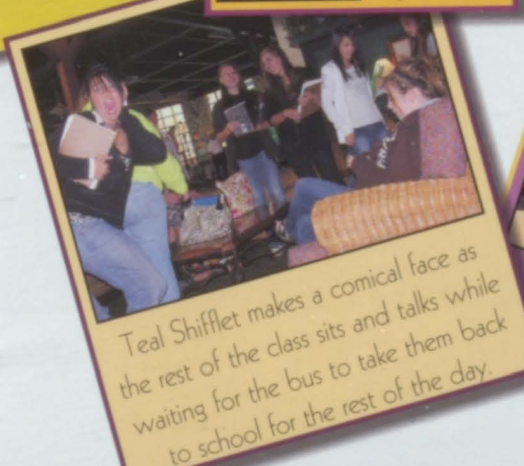

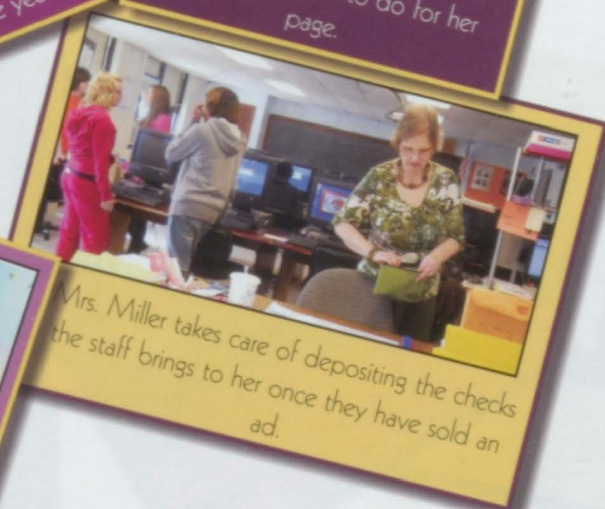

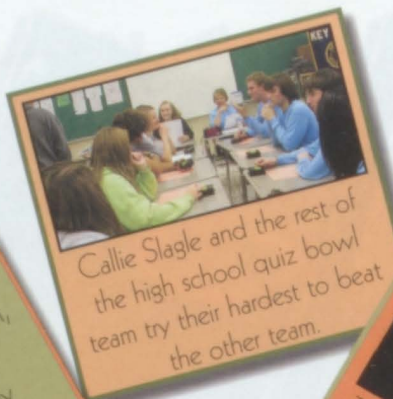

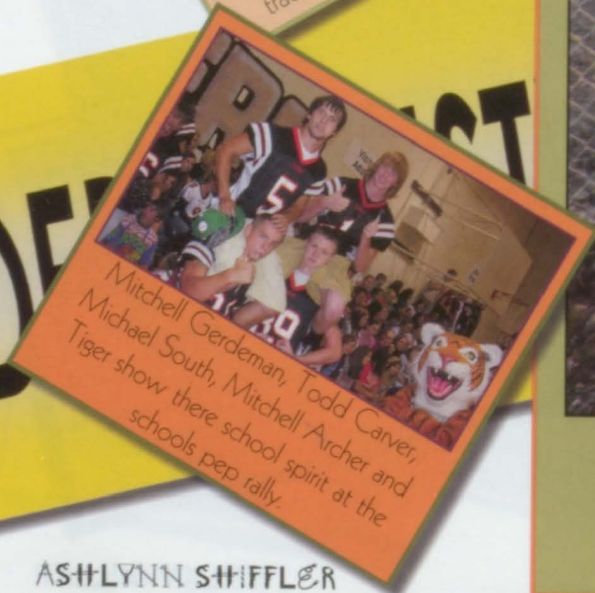

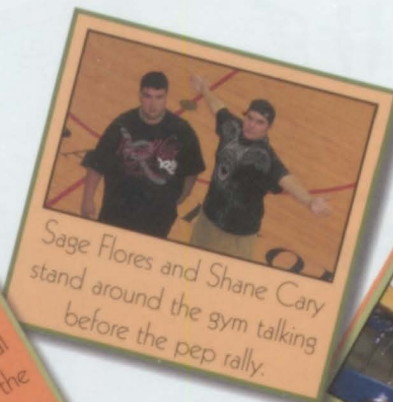

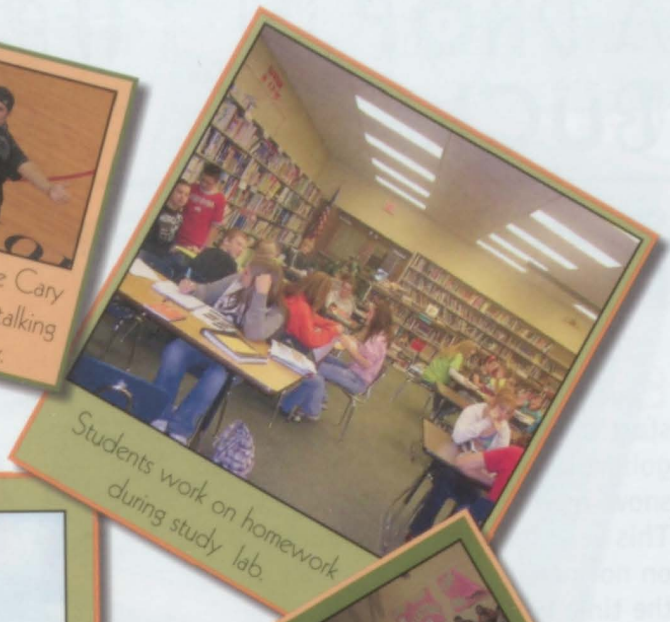

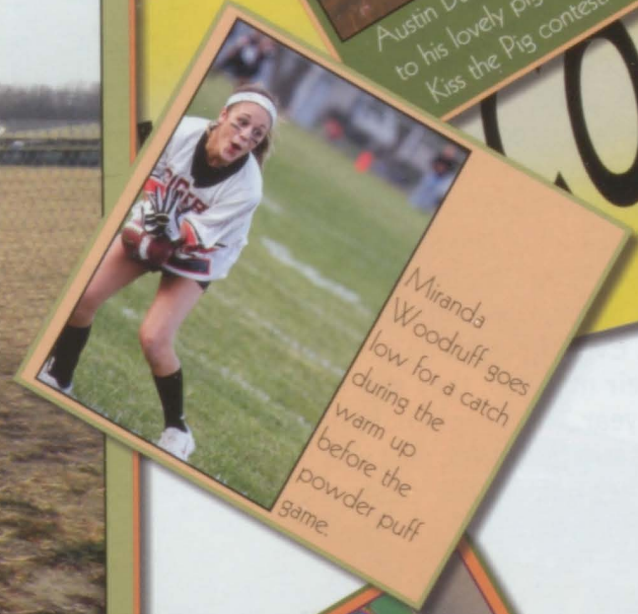

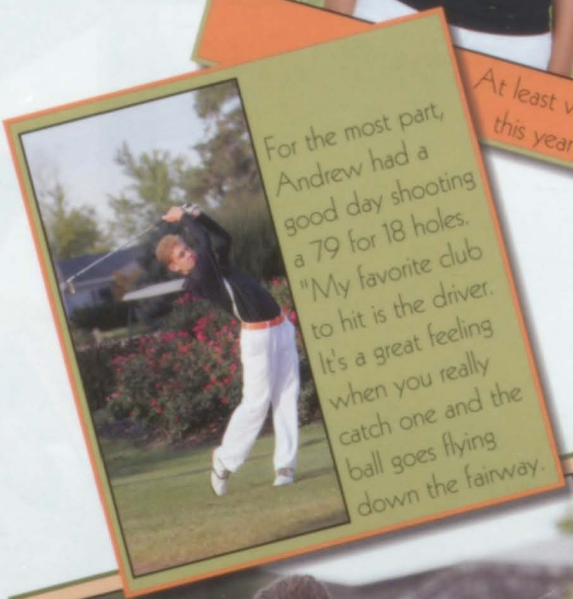
A DROP IN THE BUCKET

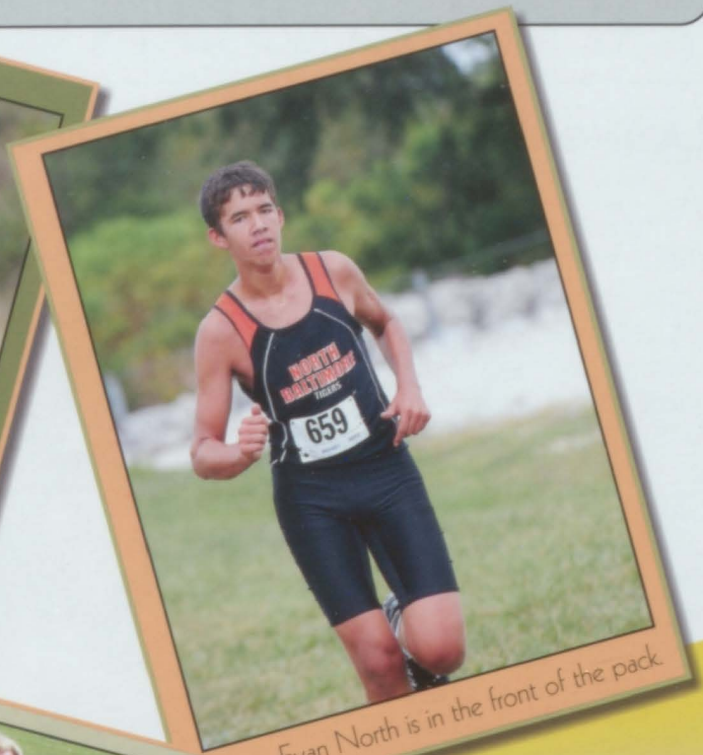

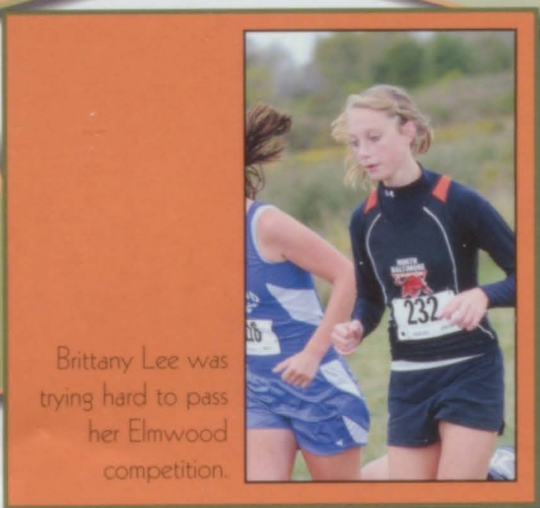

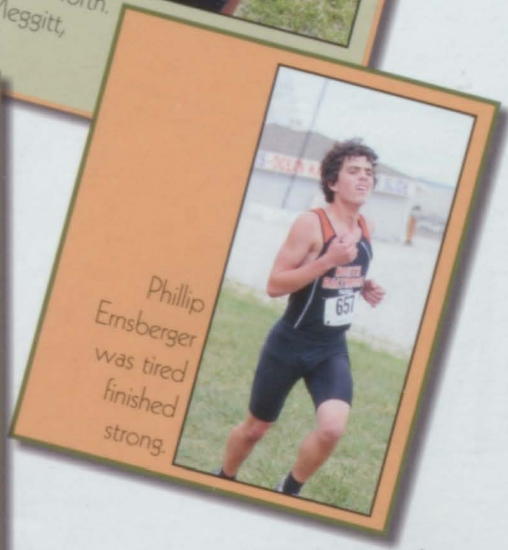

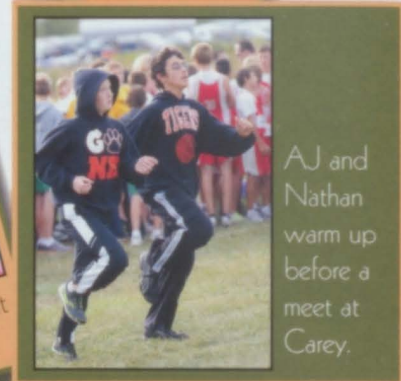

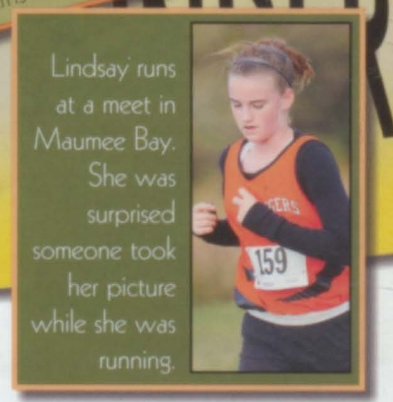
