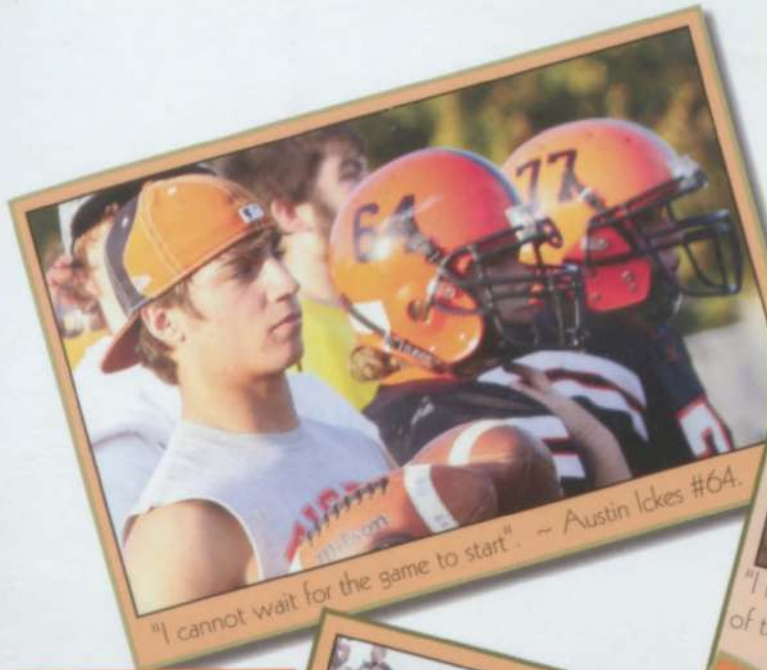


FUN AND HARDWORK

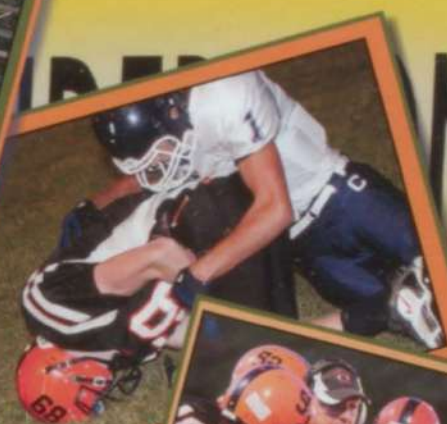

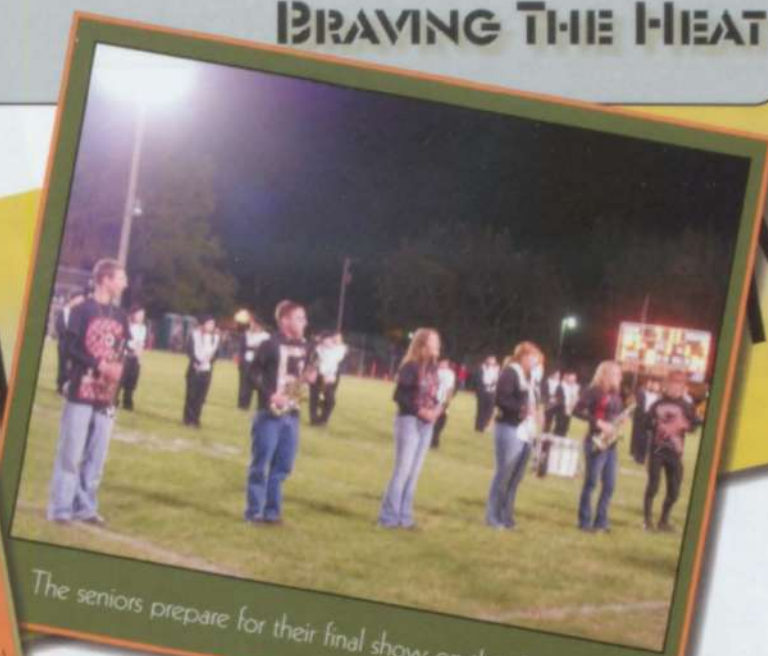

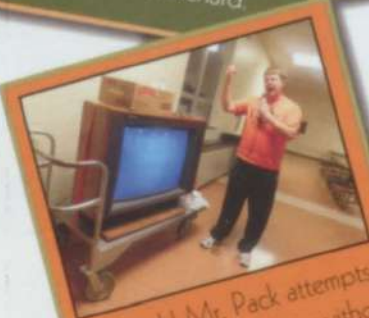
Corey Povenmire directs the band from the crowd at the homecoming game verses Carey. "I thought the homecoming show was a success, and I had a lot of fun directing this one!"

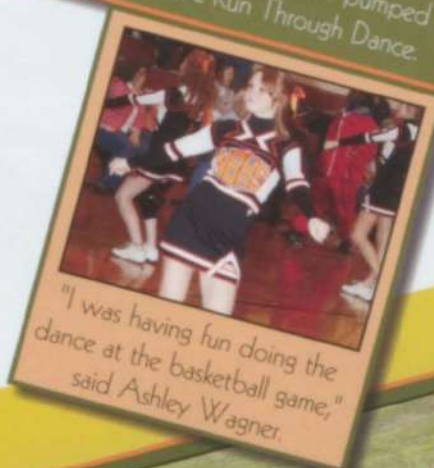

LOOKIN' GOOD!

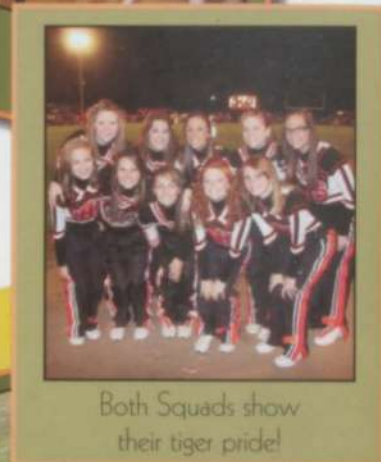

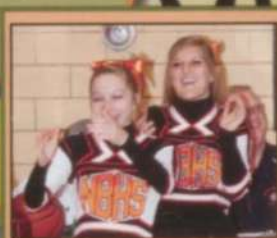

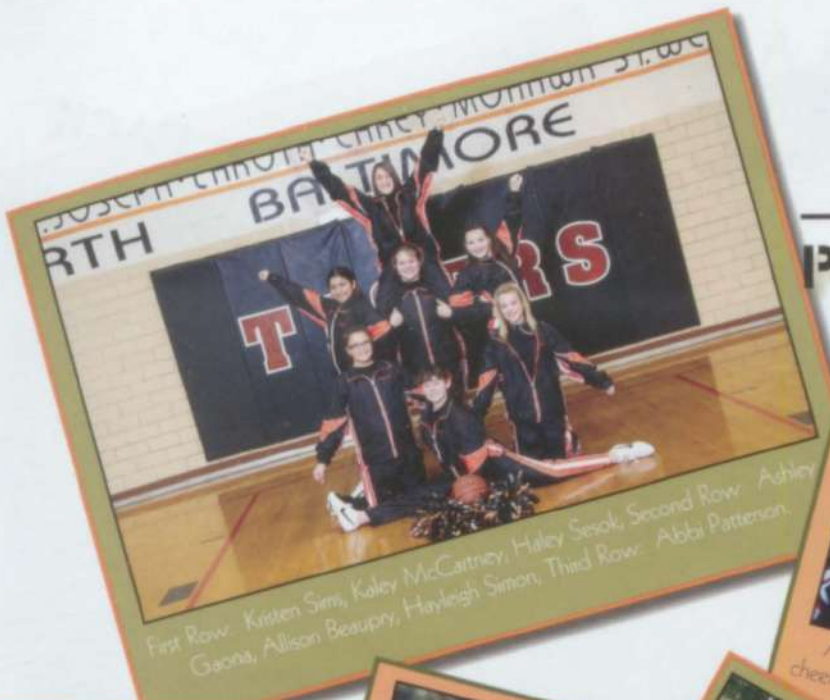

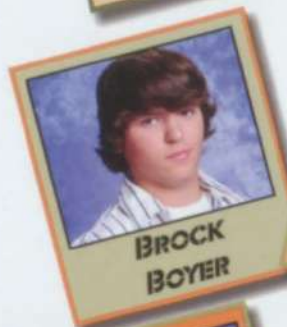
