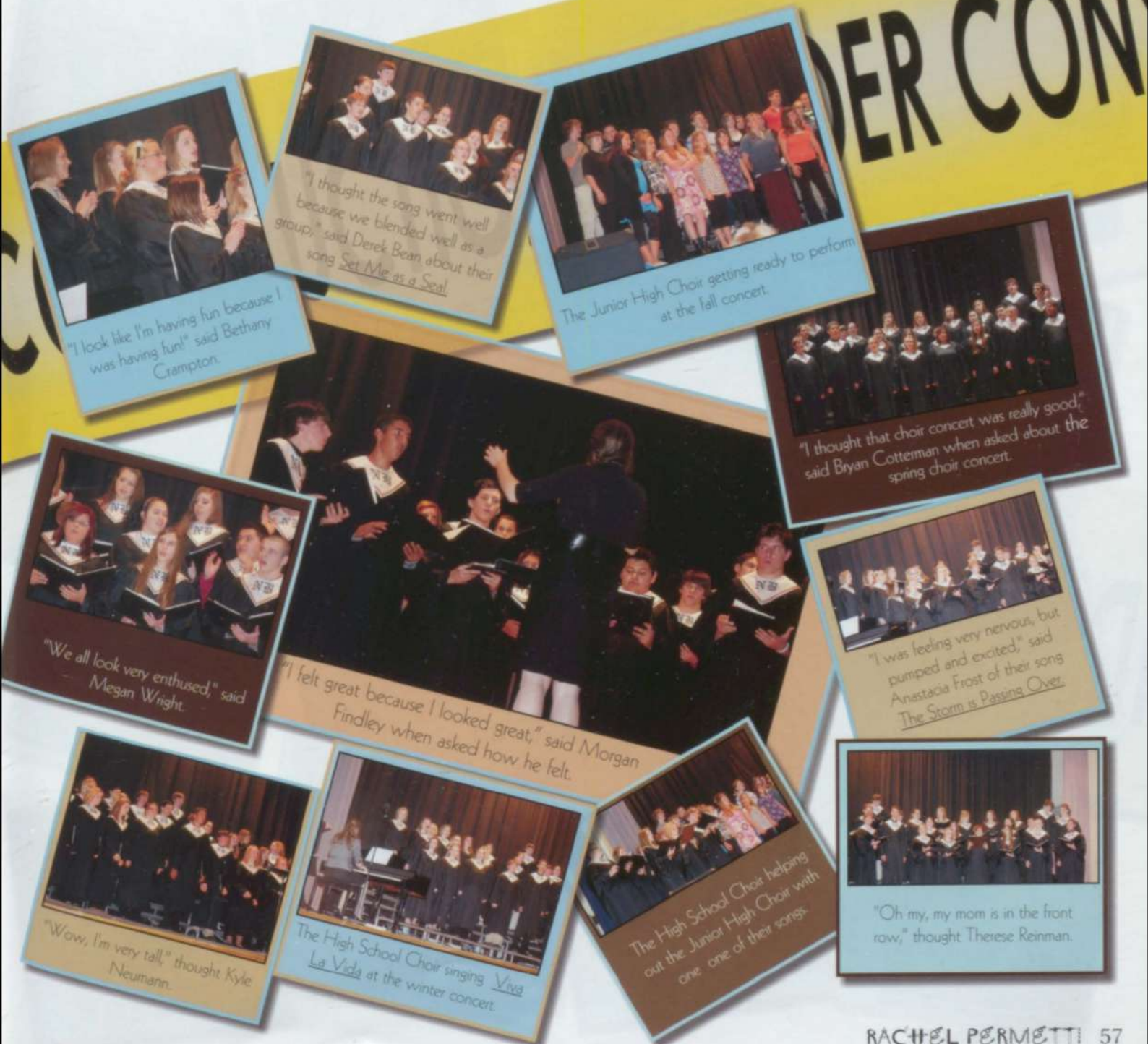

"I enjoy spending time with my friends after band concerts," said Corey Povenmire.



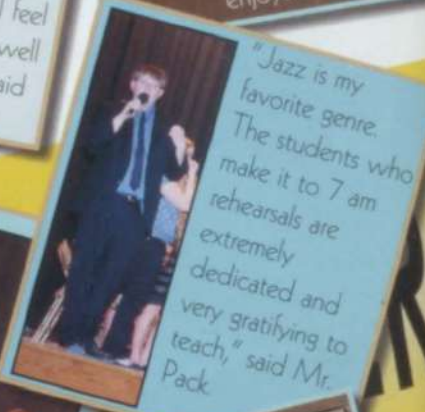
"When I play in a concert I feel nervous but it always goes well and it gets done quickly," said Cody Cotterman.

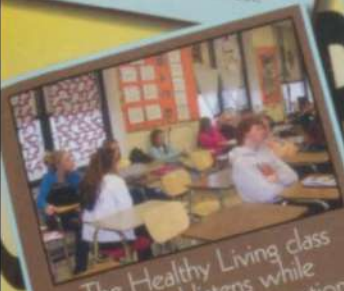

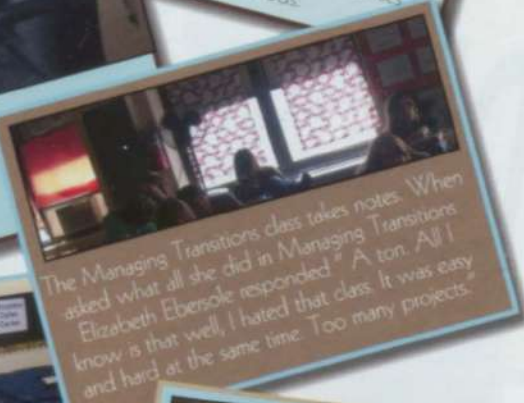

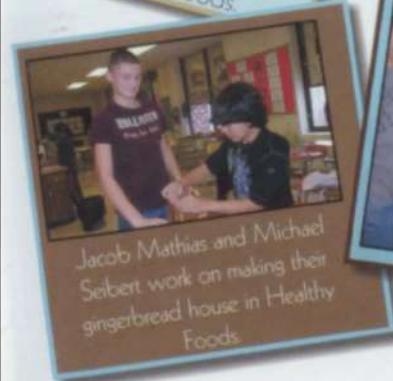

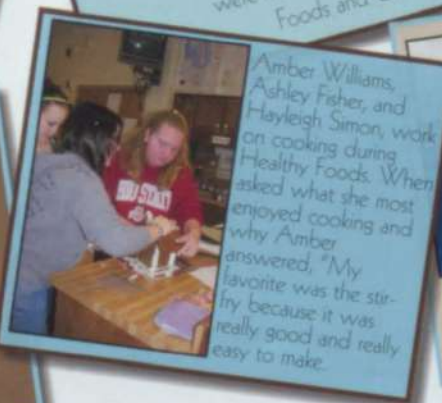

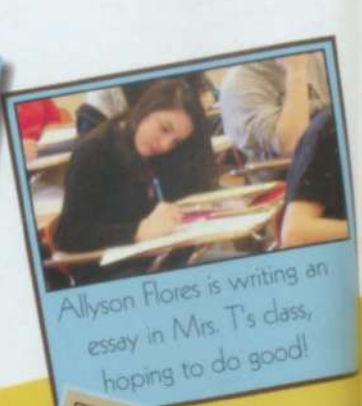

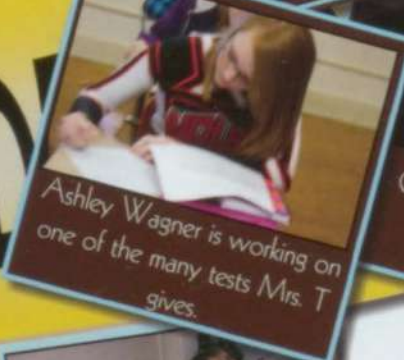

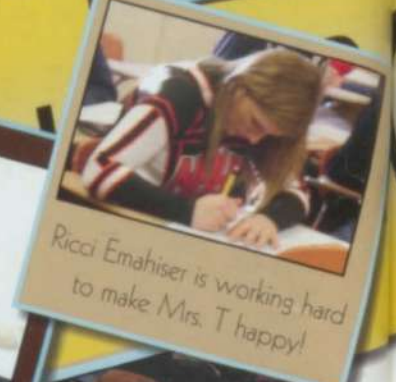

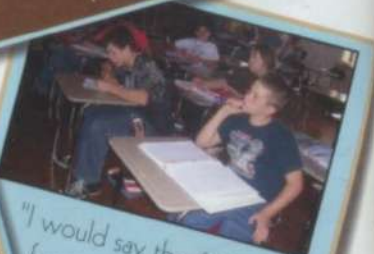

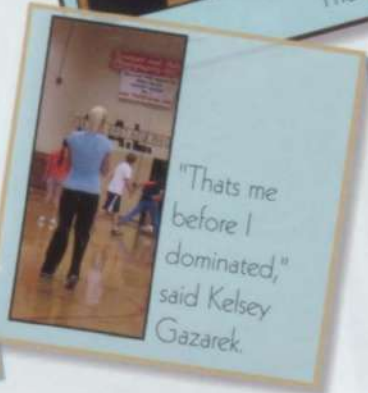

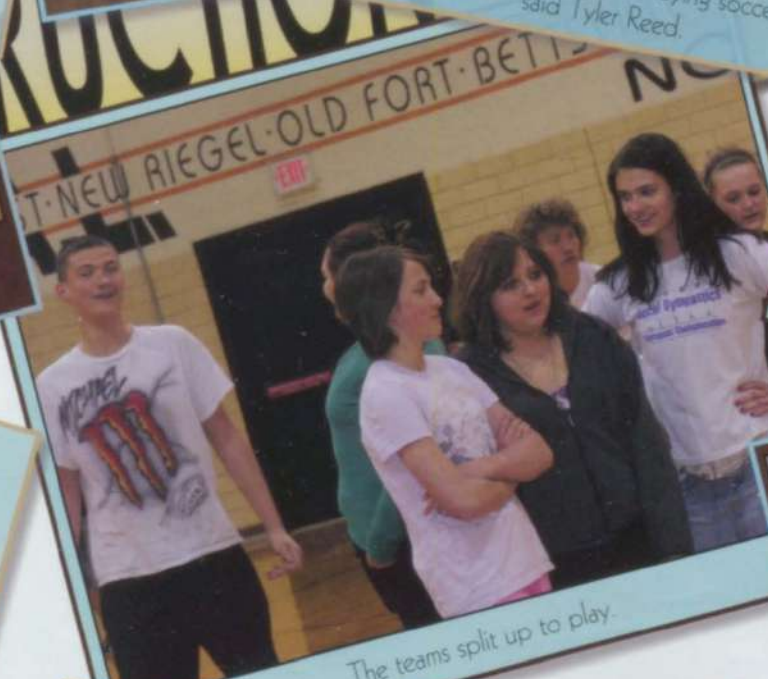

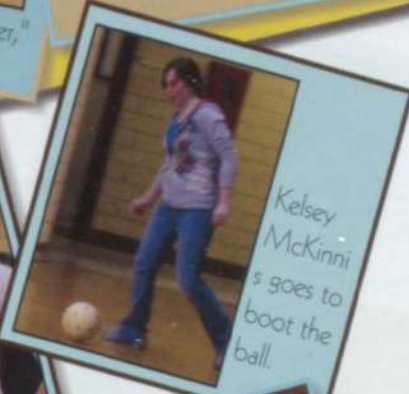

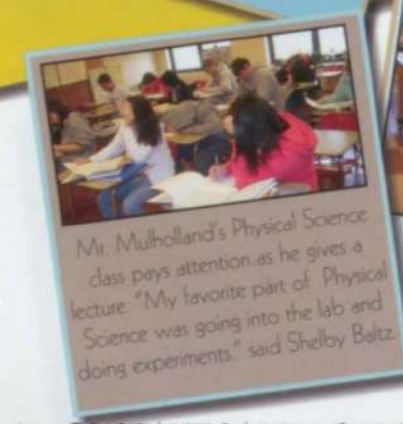

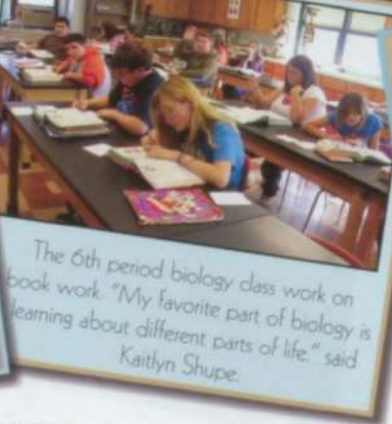

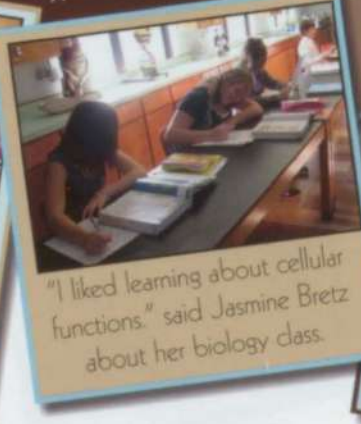

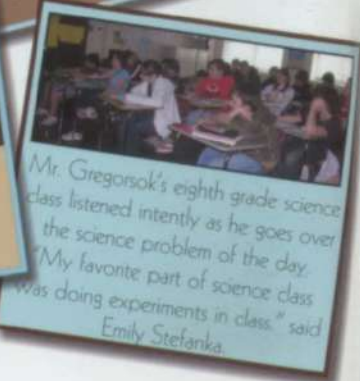

MAKING A CHANGE FOR THE FUTURE

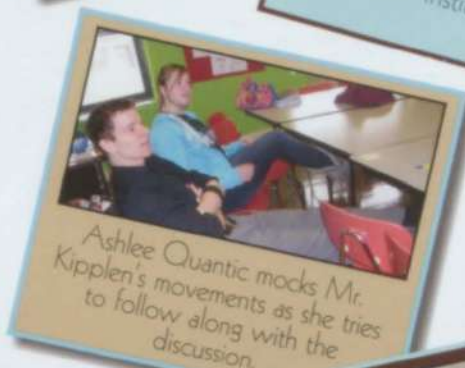

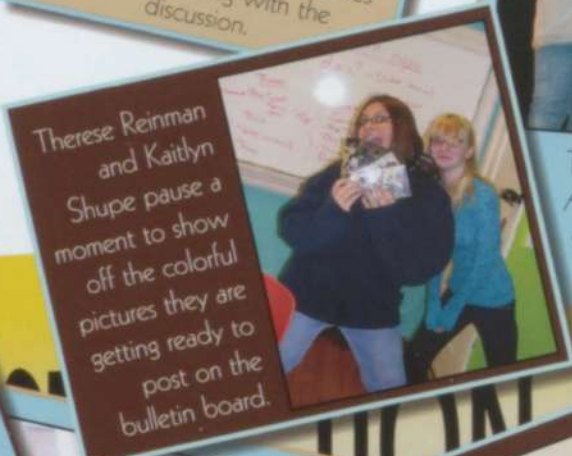

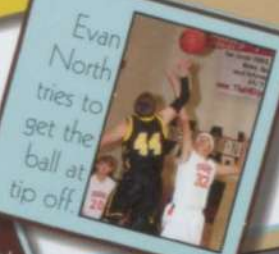

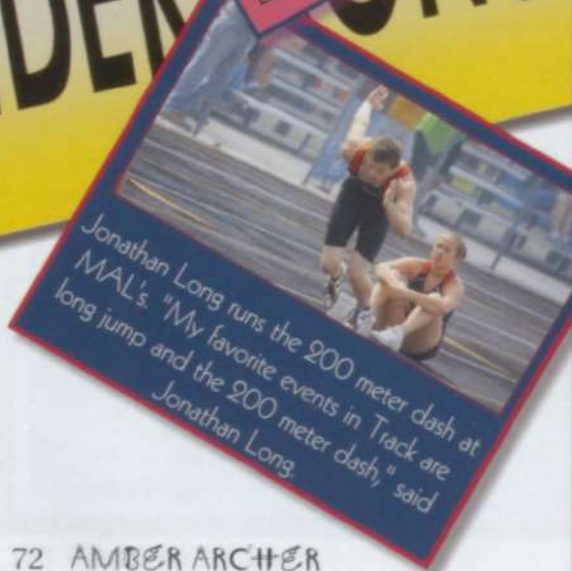

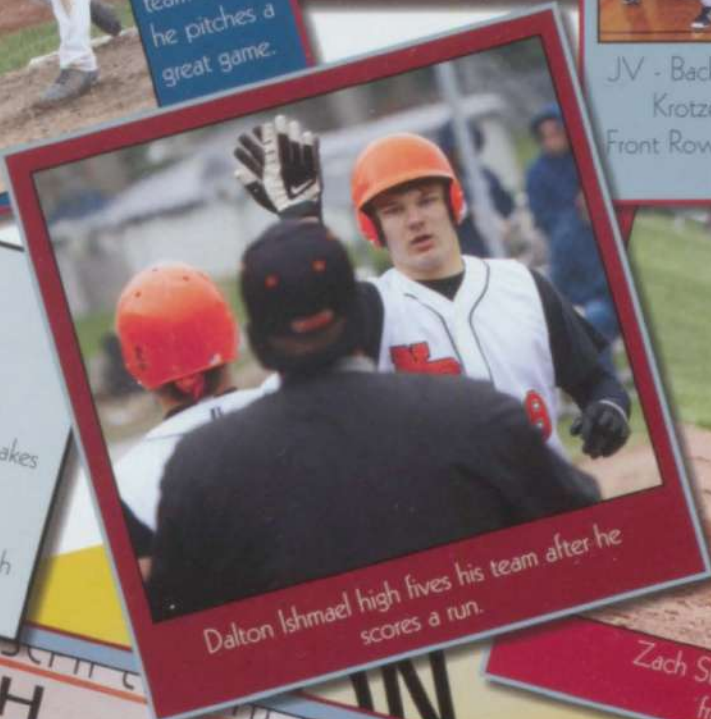
